

NOT TO SCALE



EXCERPTS FROM THE AFS DIARY

APPLICATIONS ARE BEING ACCEPTED UNTIL 30 APRIL 1989 FOR THE J. FRANCES ALLEN SCHOLARSHIP. This is a one-time award of \$2,500.00 (U.S.), for a female doctoral student whose research emphasis is in the area of fisheries science. This scholarship was established in 1986 in honor of Dr. Allen, a pioneer of women's involvement in AFS and in the field of fisheries. The qualified applicant must be a Ph.D. student and an AFS member as of December 1988. The award announcement will be made at the annual AFS meeting in September 1989. COMMON AND SCIENTIFIC NAMES OF NORTH AMERICAN MOLLUSKS has just been published by AFS and is available in hard and soft cover. The 280-page book contains some spectacular color photos and includes all 5700 molluscan species in North America. The new book was produced by Dr. Donna Turgeon and her AFS Committee on Common and Scientific Names of Aquatic Invertebrates. The Committee's work and common name designations were done with full participation by major malacological organizations. Hard (cloth) bound books sell for \$24.00 to members and \$30.00 to non-members. Paper bound copies sell for \$19.00 to members and \$24.00 to non-members.

Other newly available AFS publications are:

Larval Fish and Shellfish Transportation Inlets - This is AFS Symposium Series 3, containing papers presented at the 1985, Ocean Springs, Mississippi, workshop and edited by M.P. Weinstein. \$12.00 members; \$15.00 non-members.

<u>Status</u> and <u>Management of Interior Stocks of Cutthroat Trout</u> - This synopsis of information concerning interior stocks of cutthroat trout emanated from the 1979 special session at the AFS annual meeting in West Yellowstone, Montana. Edited by Robert Gresswell, the 140-page soft-cover book is Symposium Series 4. \$12.00 members; \$17.00 non-members.

11th Annual Larval Fish Conference - is Symposium Series 5, edited by Robert Hoyt. It contains proceedings of a June 1-3, 1987, conference in Houghton, Michigan. With 130 pages the soft cover proceedings sells for \$12.00 members; \$15.00 non-members.

Science, Law, and Hudson River Power Plants - is a 350-page report on the largest, most expensive and litigious power plant case and covers large-river sampling, fish biology, modeling controversies, legal issues, and other lessons learned about conducting science in a regulatory environment. This is AFS Monograph 4 edited by Barnthouse, Klauda, Vaughan and Kendall. \$28.00 members; \$33.00 non-members.

THE USFWS FISHERIES ACADEMY 1988-89 COURSE CATALOG is available to anyone who writes to the Academy at Route 3, Box 49, Kearneysville, WV 25430. Courses include Fish Health Management and Disease Diagnosis, Pacific Salmon Culture, Coldwater Fish Culture, Introduction to Fish Health, Principles and Techniques of Electrofishing, plus 28 other short courses and audio visual presentations.

WORLD FISHERIES CONGRESS, APRIL 1991, ATHENS, GREECE. Presentations during this scientific meeting will assess the state of the world's fisheries resources with the goal of promoting scientific collaboration. There is a questionnaire for new users to fill out online, and then you are free to explore the board, read and respond to messages, or to download files. Help is available by typing H at the prompt. Any AFS subunit that wishes to open a conference area should contact the SYSOP.

THE FISH CULTURE SECTION'S ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES provided notice that: (1) the Genetics, Administrators, and Fish Culture Sections are cooperating in drafting an AFS policy on genetic engineering; (2) Vince Mudrak and committee have completed ambitious preparations for Section participation in Aquaculture '89 scheduled for Los Angeles in February 1989 (the AFS central office will send Paul Brouha and Karen Maggi to provide staff assistance); (3) the Society-sponsored Fish Culture Hall of Fame under Arden Trandahl's leadership is successful, popular, and growing; (4) the Section is making great progress in drafting the AFS position on aquaculture; and (5) Bob Stickney is developing plans for a "net pen culture" symposium as part of the Society's annual technical program in Anchorage this September.

"MAKING NON-POINT POLLUTION CONTROL PROGRAMS WORK" is the title of an April 23-26, 1989, conference at the Clarion Hotel in St. Louis, Mo. The conference will feature invited presentations from key legislators, federal agencies, industry leaders, farmers, and concerned citizens, as well as submitted papers from water quality researchers and practitioners. AFS is one of 20 co-sponsoring groups while the National Association of Conservation Districts and 10 other organizations and agencies are primary sponsors. THE SECOND SESSION OF THE 100TH CONGRESS HAS ADJOURNED and there were several key successes for fisheries:

Wallop-Breaux amendments were reauthorized through 1994. At this point, California sport fishing groups are requesting an analysis of the formula for distribution of funds to the states. The American League of Anglers and Boasters (ALAB) will review a first-cut evaluation of state-by-state expenditures for fishing tackle and marine fuel by the Sport Fishing Institute at its November meeting. In the longer term, a symposium to show the success of Wallop-Breaux is being planned for National Fishing Week two years hence and a survey will be conducted to more completely document each state's contribution of marine fuel tax.

The Striped Bass Act was reauthorized until 1991 and amended to provide for a \$1 million striped bass study (funds not to come from the Emergency Striped Bass Act) in the Roanoke River and Pamlico Sound in conjunction with a proposed water delivery pipeline. The Act was also amended to authorize the Secretary of Commerce to regulate striped bass commerce through Maryland from the Exclusive Economic Zone.

Ocean dumping legislation passed to require the cessation of dumping by 1992. A Clean Oceans Trust Fund is also created using ocean dumping fees.

The reauthorization of the Endangered Species Act provided for use of turtle excluder devices (TEDS) by shrimp fishermen starting May 1, 1989, (except off the Florida coast near Cape Canaveral where they are presently required). Additionally, the National Academy of Sciences will review scientific literature to assess whether sea turtles are really endangered, whether there are feasible alternatives to TEDS, and to what extent shrimping is affecting turtle populations.

1989 appropriations essentially doubled the Forest Service fishery habitat improvement budgets (resident fish \$6.2 million and \$9.9 million for anadromous fish) and increased staffing by 100 biologist positions. The Bureau of Land Management's fishery budget was increased by \$750,000 and riparian management a similar amount (in the grazing management function). The National Marine Fisheries Service received level funding despite an initial 48% cut proposed by the Administration. The Fish and Wildlife Service got a small increase to encourage the agency to emphasize its refuge fishery management - not nearly enough to address the need.

THE NEW AFS PROCEDURAL MANUAL has been printed and is now available. The central office is mailing a copy to all Society subunit officers and committee chairs. Additional printed copies will be mailed to any member who provides a 7 1/2" by 10 1/2" or larger envelope carrying the 90 cents postage necessary for 4th class book rate. The manual is a really useful tool for figuring out how to make the Society work for you and how to effectively work within the Society.

UPDATING AND EXPANDING THE AFS MONETARY VALUES OF FRESHWATER FISH AND FISH-KILL COUNTING GUIDELINES is a goal of the active and enthusiastic Socioeconomics Section. The Section is developing plans and resources to (1) update the 1979-80 hatchery cost survey and for the first time include marine and anadromous fish hatchery costs; and (2) prepare an extensive review of economic values of fish, the application of such values for damage assessments, etc., and a "Handbook on Economic Values for Fish." THE CREEL AND ANGLER SURVEY SYMPOSIUM STEERING COMMITTEE (Dr. Bob Ditton, Chairman) met at AFS central offices to continue planning for this major AFS/U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service sponsored event. The exact time and place have not been fixed but all plans point to late January or February 1990, in Houston, Galveston, or Corpus Christi. A large and active committee is hard at work, most session chairs and co-chairs have been selected. A trade show is being planned, continuing education credits will be issued, and results will be documented in formal proceedings and a state-of-the-art manual. THE AFS FISHERIES SCIENTIST CERTIFICATION process continues to move methodically forward and now lists 1,204 Certified Fisheries Scientists and 46 Associate Fisheries Scientists. For information on the certification program write to Toni Brome in the central office.
